

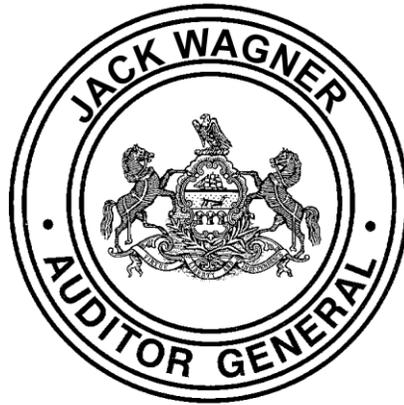
CITY OF BEAVER FALLS POLICE PENSION PLAN

BEAVER COUNTY

COMPLIANCE AUDIT REPORT

FOR THE PERIOD

JANUARY 1, 2010, TO DECEMBER 31, 2011



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BACKGROUND

On December 18, 1984, the Pennsylvania Legislature adopted the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (P.L. 1005, No. 205, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.101 et seq.). The act established mandatory actuarial reporting and funding requirements and a uniform basis for the distribution of state aid to Pennsylvania's public pension plans. Section 402(j) of Act 205 specifically requires the Auditor General, as deemed necessary, to make an audit of every municipality which receives general municipal pension system State aid and of every municipal pension plan and fund in which general municipal pension system State aid is deposited.

Pension plan aid is provided from a 2 percent foreign casualty insurance premium tax, a portion of the foreign fire insurance tax designated for paid firefighters and any investment income earned on the collection of these taxes. Generally, municipal pension plans established prior to December 18, 1984, are eligible for state aid. For municipal pension plans established after that date, the sponsoring municipality must fund the plan for three plan years before it becomes eligible for state aid. In accordance with Act 205, a municipality's annual state aid allocation cannot exceed its actual pension costs.

In addition to Act 205, the City of Beaver Falls Police Pension Plan is also governed by implementing regulations adopted by the Public Employee Retirement Commission published at Title 16, Part IV of the Pennsylvania Code and applicable provisions of various other state statutes including, but not limited to, the following:

Act 147 - Special Ad Hoc Municipal Police and Firefighter Postretirement Adjustment Act, Act of December 14, 1988 (P.L. 1192, No. 147), as amended, 53 P.S. § 896.101 et seq.

Act 317 - The Third Class City Code, Act of June 23, 1931 (P.L. 932, No. 317), as amended, 53 P.S. § 35101 et seq.

The City of Beaver Falls Police Pension Plan is a single-employer defined benefit pension plan locally controlled by the provisions of Ordinance No. 858, as amended, adopted pursuant to Act 317. The plan is also affected by the provisions of collective bargaining agreements between the city and its police officers.

We have conducted a compliance audit of the City of Beaver Falls Police Pension Plan for the period January 1, 2010, to December 31, 2011. The audit was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Section 402(j) of Act 205 and in accordance with the standards applicable to performance audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our audit objective. We believe that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our audit objective.

The objective of the audit was to determine if the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies.

Our audit was limited to the areas related to the objective identified above. Our methodology addressed determinations about the following:

- Whether state aid was properly determined and deposited in accordance with Act 205 requirements.
- Whether employer contributions are determined and deposited in accordance with the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations.
- Whether employee contributions are required and, if so, are determined, deducted and deposited into the pension plan and are in accordance with the plan provisions and applicable laws and regulations.
- Whether benefit payments, if any, represent payments to all (and only) those entitled to receive them and are properly determined in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.

- Whether obligations for plan benefits are accurately determined in accordance with plan provisions and based on complete and accurate participant data; and whether actuarial valuation reports are prepared and submitted to the Public Employee Retirement Commission (PERC) in accordance with state law and selected information provided on these reports is accurate, complete and in accordance with plan provisions to ensure compliance for participation in the state aid program.
- Whether the special ad hoc postretirement adjustment granted to eligible pensioners is in accordance with applicable laws and regulations and whether the ad hoc reimbursement received by the municipality was treated in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.
- Whether benefit payments have only been made to living recipients, based on the Social Security numbers found in the pension records for retirees and beneficiaries.
- Whether refunds are made to eligible members in accordance with the plan provisions and applicable laws and regulations.

The City of Beaver Falls contracted with an independent certified public accounting firm for annual audits of its basic financial statements which are available at the city's offices. Those financial statements were not audited by us and, accordingly, we express no opinion or other form of assurance on them.

City officials are responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal controls to provide reasonable assurance that the City of Beaver Falls Police Pension Plan is administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies. In conducting our audit, we obtained an understanding of the city's internal controls as they relate to the city's compliance with those requirements and that we considered to be significant within the context of our audit objective, and assessed whether those significant controls were properly designed and implemented. Additionally, we tested transactions, assessed official actions, performed analytical procedures and interviewed selected officials to provide reasonable assurance of detecting instances of noncompliance with legal and regulatory requirements or noncompliance with provisions of contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies that are significant within the context of the audit objective.

The results of our tests indicated that, in all significant respects, the City of Beaver Falls Police Pension Plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies, except as noted in the following findings further discussed later in this report:

Finding No. 1 – Failure To Aggregate Pension Funds Pursuant To Act 44 Provisions

Finding No. 2 – Disability Pension Benefit Not Properly Documented

As previously noted, the objective of our audit of the City of Beaver Falls Police Pension Plan was to determine compliance with applicable state laws, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies. Act 205 was amended on September 18, 2009, through the adoption of Act 44 of 2009. Among several provisions relating to municipal pension plans, the bill provides for the implementation of a distress recovery program. Three levels of distress have been established:



The accompanying supplementary information is presented for purposes of additional analysis. We did not audit the information and, accordingly, express no form of assurance on it. However, we are extremely concerned about the funded status of the plan contained in the schedule of funding progress included in this report which indicates the plan's funded ratio is 64.6% as of January 1, 2011, which is the most recent date available. Based on this information, the Public Employee Retirement Commission issued a notification that the city is currently in Level II moderate distress status. We encourage city officials to monitor the funding of the police pension plan to ensure its long-term financial stability.

The contents of this report were discussed with officials of the City of Beaver Falls and, where appropriate, their responses have been included in the report.

FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Finding No. 1 – Failure To Aggregate Pension Funds Pursuant To Act 44 Provisions

Condition: Act 205 was amended on September 18, 2009, through the adoption of Act 44 of 2009. Among several provisions relating to municipal pension plans, the bill provides for the implementation of a distress recovery program. Three levels of distress have been established:

<u>Level</u>	<u>Indication</u>	<u>Funding Criteria</u>
I	Minimal distress	70-89%
II	Moderate distress	50-69%
III	Severe distress	Less than 50%

Based on the plan’s funded ratio of 69.4% as of January 1, 2009, in aggregation with the funded ratios of the city’s other pension plans, the Public Employee Retirement Commission (PERC) issued a notification in 2010 that the city was in Level II moderate distress status. Subsequently, based on the plan’s funded ratio of 64.6% as of January 1, 2011, in aggregation with the funded ratios of the city’s other pension plans, PERC issued another notification in 2012 that the city remains in Level II moderate distress status.

Included with the initial determination notice, PERC sent the city the Act 205 Recovery Program Election Form outlining the mandatory remedies that must be implemented and the voluntary remedies that the city could elect to implement. This form was required to be signed by the plan’s chief administrative officer and returned to PERC.

On August 31, 2010, the city returned the election form to PERC; however, through the date of this audit report, the city has not initiated the process to aggregate its pension funds in accordance with Act 44 requirements, which is a mandatory remedy for municipalities determined to be in Level II moderate distress status.

Criteria: Act 205, amended by Act 44, at Section 605(a) states, in part:

Recovery program level II.

(a) Mandatory remedies. Any municipality to which level II of the recovery program applies shall utilize the following remedies:

(1) The aggregation of trust funds pursuant to section 607(b).

Cause: City officials failed to establish adequate internal control procedures to ensure the implementation of the mandatory aggregation remedy as required by Act 44.

Finding No. 1 – (Continued)

Effect: The failure to aggregate its pension funds could deny the city the benefits of administrative efficiencies and increased investment returns that could be realized through the aggregation of its pension plans.

Recommendation: We recommend that city officials contact PERC for guidance in the implementation of the mandatory aggregation remedy contained in Act 44 of 2009.

Management’s Response: City officials agreed with the finding without exception.

Finding No. 2 – Disability Pension Benefit Not Properly Documented

Condition: City officials granted a disability pension benefit to a police officer on December 31, 2010, without proper medical documentation. The city failed to obtain the required medical evidence certifying that the police officer is physically disabled as required by the Third Class City Code and the plan’s governing document.

Criteria: Section 4303.2(b) of the Third Class City Code states:

Claims under this section shall be decided by the governing body of the city. Proof of disability shall be by competent medical evidence provided by claimant. The governing body of the city may at any time have the claimant examined by its own physician.

Furthermore, Ordinance No. 858 at Section 8 states:

No police officer shall be pensioned for physical disabilities received in line of duty until the Board of Directors shall have been advised by means of written opinion or certificate of three reputable practicing physicians of at least ten years experience in the City of Beaver Falls, said certificate or opinion shall set forth the examining physician’s conclusions as to the officer’s physical disability, his reasons therefore and a history of the case leading up to the act of physical disability incurred in the line of duty.

Cause: City officials failed to establish adequate internal control procedures to ensure that the disability pension benefit was properly supported by adequate medical documentation as required by the Third Class City Code and the plan’s governing document.

Finding No. 2 – (Continued)

Effect: The plan is paying a disability pension benefit without appropriate medical documentation to support the propriety of the payments.

Recommendation: We recommend that city officials obtain appropriate medical documentation to verify that the disability benefit already granted is properly authorized in accordance with the Third Class City Code and the plan's governing document.

Management's Response: City officials agreed with the finding without exception.

SCHEDULE OF FUNDING PROGRESS

Historical trend information about the plan is presented herewith as supplementary information. It is intended to help users assess the plan's funding status on a going-concern basis, assess progress made in accumulating assets to pay benefits when due, and make comparisons with other state and local government retirement systems.

The actuarial information is required by Act 205 biennially. The historical information, beginning as of January 1, 2007, is as follows:

Note: The market values of the plan's assets at 01-01-07, 01-01-09 and 01-01-11, have been adjusted to reflect the smoothing of gains and/or losses over a 4-year averaging period. This method will lower contributions in years of less than expected returns and increase contributions in years of greater than expected returns. The net effect over long periods of time is to have less variance in contribution levels from year to year.

The comparability of trend information is affected by changes in actuarial assumptions, benefit provisions, actuarial funding methods, accounting policies, and other changes. Those changes usually affect trends in contribution requirements and in ratios that use the actuarial accrued liability as a factor.

Analysis of the dollar amount of the actuarial value of assets, actuarial accrued liability, and unfunded (assets in excess of) actuarial accrued liability in isolation can be misleading. Expressing the actuarial value of assets as a percentage of the actuarial accrued liability (Column 4) provides one indication of the plan's funding status on a going-concern basis. Analysis of this percentage, over time, indicates whether the system is becoming financially stronger or weaker. Generally, the greater this percentage, the stronger the plan.

Trends in unfunded (assets in excess of) actuarial accrued liability and annual covered payroll are both affected by inflation. Expressing the unfunded (assets in excess of) actuarial accrued liability as a percentage of annual covered payroll (Column 6) approximately adjusts for the effects of inflation and aids analysis of the plan's progress made in accumulating sufficient assets to pay benefits when due. Generally, where there is an unfunded actuarial accrued liability, the smaller this percentage, the stronger the plan. However, when assets are in excess of the actuarial accrued liability, the higher the bracketed percentage, the stronger the plan.


