
# PARKS TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN ARMSTRONG COUNTY

COMPLIANCE AUDIT REPORT

FOR THE PERIOD

JANUARY 1, 2005, TO DECEMBER 31, 2007



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#### **BACKGROUND**

On December 18, 1984, the Pennsylvania Legislature adopted the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (P.L. 1005, No. 205, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.101 et seq.). The act established mandatory actuarial reporting and funding requirements and a uniform basis for the distribution of state aid to Pennsylvania's public pension plans. Section 402(j) of Act 205 specifically requires the Auditor General, as deemed necessary, to make an audit of every municipality which receives general municipal pension system State aid and of every municipal pension plan and fund in which general municipal pension system State aid is deposited.

Pension plan aid is provided from a 2 percent foreign casualty insurance premium tax, a portion of the foreign fire insurance tax designated for paid firefighters and any investment income earned on the collection of these taxes. Generally, municipal pension plans established prior to December 18, 1984, are eligible for state aid. For municipal pension plans established after that date, the sponsoring municipality must fund the plan for three plan years before it becomes eligible for state aid. In accordance with Act 205, a municipality's annual state aid allocation cannot exceed its actual pension costs.

In addition to Act 205, the Parks Township Police Pension Plan is also governed by implementing regulations adopted by the Public Employee Retirement Commission published at Title 16, Part IV of the Pennsylvania Code and applicable provisions of various other state statutes including, but not limited to, the following:

Act 69 - The Second Class Township Code, Act of May 1, 1933 (P.L. 103, No. 69), as reenacted and amended, 53 P.S. § 65101 et seq.

The Parks Township Police Pension Plan is a single-employer defined benefit pension plan locally controlled by the provisions of Ordinance No. 8-31-66, as amended, adopted pursuant to Act 69. The plan is also affected by the provisions of collective bargaining agreements between the township and its police officers.

We have conducted a compliance audit of the Parks Township Police Pension Plan for the period January 1, 2005, to December 31, 2007. The audit was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Section 402(j) of Act 205 and in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* applicable to performance audits issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform our audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our finding and conclusions based on our audit objectives. We believe that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for our finding and conclusions based on our audit objectives.

### The objectives of the audit were:

- 1. To determine if municipal officials took appropriate corrective action to address the finding contained in our prior audit report; and
- 2. To determine if the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies.

Our audit was limited to the areas related to the objectives identified above.

Township officials are responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure to provide reasonable assurance that the Parks Township Police Pension Plan is administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies. To assist us in planning and performing our audit, we obtained an understanding of the township's internal control structure as it relates to the township's compliance with those requirements. Additionally, we tested transactions, assessed official actions, performed analytical procedures and interviewed selected officials to the extent necessary to satisfy the audit objectives.

The results of our tests indicated that, in all significant respects, the Parks Township Police Pension Plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies, except as noted in the following finding further discussed later in this report:

Finding – Pension Benefits In Excess Of Act 69

The accompanying supplementary information is presented for purposes of additional analysis. We did not audit the information and, accordingly, express no form of assurance on it.

The contents of this report were discussed with officials of Parks Township and, where appropriate, their responses have been included in the report.

## PARKS TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN STATUS OF PRIOR FINDING

### Noncompliance With Prior Audit Recommendation

Parks Township has not complied with the prior audit recommendation concerning the following as further discussed in the Finding and Recommendation section of this report:

· Pension Benefits In Excess Of Act 69

### PARKS TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN FINDING AND RECOMMENDATION

### <u>Finding – Noncompliance With Prior Audit Recommendation – Pension Benefits In Excess Of</u> Act 69

<u>Condition</u>: As disclosed in our prior audit report, the pension plan's governing document grants a survivor benefit that is not authorized by Act 69. Section 3 of Ordinance No. 8-9-93 states, in part:

In the event that a police officer or retiree dies, that individual's spouse shall be entitled to a pension equal to the amount the individual was receiving, or would have been receiving, had the individual been retired at the time of death. Said pension to the surviving spouse shall be payable during the spouse's lifetime, or until remarriage. If no spouse survives or if the spouse survives and subsequently dies or remarries, said pension shall be payable to any child of the police officer until said child reaches the age of eighteen (18) years.

### Criteria: Section 1910(b) of Act 69 states:

The fund shall be under the direction of the board of supervisors for the benefit of members of the police force who receive honorable discharge therefrom by reason of age or disability and the families of members who may be injured or killed in the service (emphasis added). Any allowances made to those who are retired by reason of disability or age shall be in conformity with a uniform scale.

Act 69 does not provide for survivor benefits, except in instances where the member was injured or killed in service.

<u>Cause</u>: Plan officials have failed to adopt adequate internal control procedures to ensure compliance with the prior audit recommendation.

<u>Effect</u>: Providing unauthorized pension benefits increases the plan's pension costs and reduces the amount of funds available for investment purposes or for the payment of authorized benefits or administrative expenses. Although it was determined the municipality would not be required to determine the impact of the unauthorized benefits on the plan's state aid allocations received during the audit period, the provision of unauthorized pension benefits could result in the receipt of excess state aid allocations in the future.

### PARKS TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN FINDING AND RECOMMENDATION

#### Finding – (Continued)

<u>Recommendation</u>: We again recommend that the township comply with Act 69 at its earliest opportunity to do so. To the extent that the township is not in compliance with Act 69 and/or is contractually obligated to pay benefits to existing retirees in excess of those authorized by Act 69, the excess benefits must be reflected in the Act 205 actuarial valuation reports for the plan and funded in accordance with Act 205 funding standards. Furthermore, such benefits will be deemed ineligible for funding with state pension aid. In such case, the plan's actuary may be required to determine the impact, if any, of the unauthorized benefits on the plan's future state aid allocations and submit this information to the department.

Management's Response: Municipal officials agreed with the finding without exception.

#### SCHEDULE OF FUNDING PROGRESS

Historical trend information about the plan is presented herewith as supplementary information. It is intended to help users assess the plan's funding status on a going-concern basis, assess progress made in accumulating assets to pay benefits when due, and make comparisons with other state and local government retirement systems.

The actuarial information is required by Act 205 biennially, except for distressed pension plans, for which annual reporting was required through January 1, 2003. The historical information, beginning as of January 1, 2003, is as follows:

### PARKS TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION (UNAUDITED)

The comparability of trend information is affected by changes in actuarial assumptions, benefit provisions, actuarial funding methods, accounting policies, and other changes. Those changes usually affect trends in contribution requirements and in ratios that use the actuarial accrued liability as a factor.

Analysis of the dollar amount of the actuarial value of assets, actuarial accrued liability, and unfunded (assets in excess of) actuarial accrued liability in isolation can be misleading. Expressing the actuarial value of assets as a percentage of the actuarial accrued liability (Column 4) provides one indication of the plan's funding status on a going-concern basis. Analysis of this percentage, over time, indicates whether the system is becoming financially stronger or weaker. Generally, the greater this percentage, the stronger the plan.

Trends in unfunded (assets in excess of) actuarial accrued liability and annual covered payroll are both affected by inflation. Expressing the unfunded (assets in excess of) actuarial accrued liability as a percentage of annual covered payroll (Column 6) approximately adjusts for the effects of inflation and aids analysis of the plan's progress made in accumulating sufficient assets to pay benefits when due. Generally, where there is an unfunded actuarial accrued liability, the smaller this percentage, the stronger the plan. However, when assets are in excess of the actuarial accrued liability, the higher the bracketed percentage, the stronger the plan.
