Dear Dr. Hollister and Mr. Yoder:

We conducted a Limited Procedures Engagement (LPE) of the Eastern Lancaster County School District (District) to determine its compliance with certain relevant state laws, regulations, policies, and administrative procedures (relevant requirements). The LPE covers the period July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2015, except for any areas of compliance that may have required an alternative to this period. The engagement was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. §§ 402 and 403), but was not conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

As we conducted our LPE procedures, we sought to determine answers to the following questions, which serve as our LPE objectives:

- Did the District have documented board policies and administrative procedures related to the following?
 - Internal controls
 - Budgeting practices
 - The Right-to-Know Law
 - The Sunshine Act
- Were the policies and procedures adequate and appropriate, and have they been properly implemented?
- Did the District comply with the relevant requirements in the Right-to-Know Law and the Sunshine Act?
- Did the District take appropriate corrective action to address the finding made in our prior audit, and were the actions taken into effect?






Academic Information

The following table and charts consist of School Performance Profile (SPP) scores and Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) results for the entire District obtained from PDE's data files.² These scores are presented in the District's audit report for **informational purposes only**, and they were not audited by our Department.

SPP benchmarks represent the statewide average of all district school buildings in the Commonwealth.³ PSSA benchmarks and goals are determined by PDE each school year and apply to all public school entities.⁴ District SPP and PSSA scores were calculated using an average of all of the individual school buildings within the District. Scores below SPP statewide averages and PSSA benchmarks/goals are presented in red.

In the 2011-12 school year, the state benchmarks reflect the Adequate Yearly Progress targets established under No Child Left Behind. In the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, the state benchmarks reflect the statewide goals based on annual measurable objectives established by PDE.

⁵ The following letter grades are based on a 0-100 point system: A (90-100), B (80-89), C (70-79), D (60-69), F (59 or below).



<u>4 Year Cohort Graduation Rates</u>

The cohort graduation rates are a calculation of the percentage of students who have graduated with a regular high school diploma within a designated number of years since the student first entered high school. The rate is determined for a cohort of students who have all entered high school for the first time during the same school year.⁷

Status of Prior Findings and Observations

Our prior audit of the District released on December 20, 2012, resulted in one finding, as shown below. As part of our current audit, we determined the status of corrective action taken by the District to implement our prior audit recommendations. We interviewed District personnel and performed audit procedures as detailed in each status section below.

Prior Finding	Certification Deficiency
Prior Finding Condition	Our prior audit of professional employees' certification and assignments found one individual was employed as an elementary/special education teacher without proper certification for this position.
Prior Recommendations	We recommended that the District should:
	Ensure all professional employees have current certificates and require them to obtain the required certification for the position in which they would be employed.
	We also recommended that PDE should:
	Take action to recover any forfeiture that may be levied as a result of the deficiency.
Current Status	Our current review found that the District complied with our recommendations. It was found that the individual who was cited in the prior audit received a certificate in special education on April 1, 2012.
	On December 2013, PDE deducted the amount of \$2,790 for the certification deficiency from the District's basic education subsidy.
