Dear Dr. Piraino and Dr. Borland:

We conducted a Limited Procedures Engagement (LPE) of the Franklin Regional School District (District) to determine its compliance with certain relevant state laws, regulations, policies, and administrative procedures (relevant requirements). The LPE covers the period July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2015, except for any areas of compliance that may have required an alternative to this period. The engagement was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. §§ 402 and 403), but was not conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

As we conducted our LPE procedures, we sought to determine answers to the following questions, which serve as our LPE objectives:

- Did the District have documented board policies and administrative procedures related to the following?
 - o Internal controls
 - Budgeting practices
 - The Right-to-Know Law
 - The Sunshine Act
- Were the policies and procedures adequate and appropriate, and have they been properly implemented?
- Did the District comply with the relevant requirements in the Right-to-Know Law and the Sunshine Act?
- Did the District take appropriate corrective action to address the finding made in our prior audit?




Academic Information

The following table and charts consist of School Performance Profile (SPP) scores and Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) results for the entire District obtained from PDE's data files.¹ These scores are presented in the District's audit report for **informational purposes only**, and they were not audited by our Department.

SPP benchmarks represent the statewide average of all district school buildings in the Commonwealth.² PSSA benchmarks and goals are determined by PDE each school year and apply to all public school entities.³ District SPP and PSSA scores were calculated using an average of all of the individual school buildings within the District. Scores below SPP statewide averages and PSSA benchmarks/goals are presented in red.

In the 2011-12 school year, the state benchmarks reflect the Adequate Yearly Progress targets established under No Child Left Behind. In the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, the state benchmarks reflect the statewide goals based on annual measurable objectives established by PDE.



4 Year Cohort Graduation Rates

The cohort graduation rates are a calculation of the percentage of students who have graduated with a regular high school diploma within a designated number of years since the student first entered high school. The rate is determined for a cohort of students who have all entered high school for the first time during the same school year.⁶

Status of Prior Audit Findings and Observations

Our prior audit of the District released on November 14, 2013, resulted in one finding, as shown below. As part of our current engagement, we determined the status of corrective action taken by the District to implement our prior audit recommendations. We interviewed District personnel and performed audit procedures as detailed in each status section below.

Auditor General Performance Audit Report Released on November 14, 2013

Prior Finding:	The District Lacks Sufficient Internal Controls Over Its Student Data				
Prior Finding Summary:	During our prior audit, our review of the District's controls over its data integrity found that internal controls needed to be improved.				
Prior Recommendations:	: Our prior audit finding recommended the District should:				
	1.	Reconcile all Pennsylvania Information Management System (PIMS) data submissions with the information in the District's Student Information System for accuracy and sufficiency.			
	2.	Contact PDE to determine what additional PIMS training is available and enroll all appropriate staff as soon as possible.			
	3.	Provide regular in-service training to administrative and clerical personnel responsible for recording and reporting membership data. This training should stress the importance of maintaining accurate and complete records and the relationship of membership data to state subsidies and reimbursements.			
	4.	Provide regular in-service training and/or utilize the PIMS service center to ensure the proper submission of student data into PIMS.			
	5.	Develop procedures to ensure proper classification of students enrolling in the District as resident or nonresident students, and document the district of residence of the natural parent or guardian as stressed in proper PIMS reporting.			
	6.	Review PIMS reports submitted subsequent to the year audited and, submit revised reports to PDE, if errors are found.			
	7.	Correct the deficiencies related to the newly acquired student information system, and ensure that all appropriate District personnel are sufficiently trained on the new system.			

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<u>Current Status:</u> During our current review, we found the District implemented all of our prior recommendations. The District reconciles all PIMS data submissions with information on the District's Student Information System to ensure accuracy.

The District has implemented procedures to ensure, when followed, the proper classification of students' residency. The procedures focus on obtaining students residency pre-enrollment and determining residency status throughout the District by comparing PIMS reports to the student calendar.

The District resubmitted revised reports to PDE for the 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14, and 2014-15 school years. Regular in-service training to administrative and clerical personnel responsible for recording and reporting membership data was also provided by the District.
