

Dear Dr. Dietrich and Mr. Sherpinsky:

We conducted a Limited Procedures Engagement (LPE) of the North Penn School District (District) to determine its compliance with certain relevant state laws, regulations, policies, and administrative procedures (relevant requirements). The LPE covers the period July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2016, except for any areas of compliance that may have required an alternative to this period. The engagement was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. §§ 402 and 403), but was not conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

As we conducted our LPE procedures, we sought to determine answers to the following questions, which serve as our LPE objectives:

- Did the District have documented board policies and administrative procedures related to the following?
 - Internal controls
 - o Budgeting practices
 - o The Right-to-Know Law
 - o The Sunshine Act
- Were the policies and procedures adequate and appropriate, and have they been properly implemented?
- Did the District comply with the relevant requirements in the Right-to-Know Law and the Sunshine Act?
- Did the District take appropriate corrective action to address the finding made in our prior audit?


Academic Information

The following table and charts consist of School Performance Profile (SPP) scores and Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) results for the entire District obtained from PDE's data files.² These scores are presented in the District's audit report for **informational purposes only**, and they were not audited by our Department.


SPP benchmarks represent the statewide average of all district school buildings in the Commonwealth.³ PSSA benchmarks and goals are determined by PDE each school year and apply to all public school entities.⁴ District SPP and PSSA scores were calculated using an average of all of the individual school buildings within the District. Scores below SPP statewide averages and PSSA benchmarks/goals are presented in red.

In the 2011-12 school year, the state benchmarks reflect the Adequate Yearly Progress targets established under No Child Left Behind. In the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, the state benchmarks reflect the statewide goals based on annual measurable objectives established by PDE.



4 Year Cohort Graduation Rates

The cohort graduation rates are a calculation of the percentage of students who have graduated with a regular high school diploma within a designated number of years since the student first entered high school. The rate is determined for a cohort of students who have all entered high school for the first time during the same school year.⁷

Status of Prior Audit Findings and Observations

ur prior audit of the District released on June 26, 2014, resulted in one finding, as shown below. As part of our current engagement, we determined the status of corrective action taken by the District to implement our prior audit recommendations. We reviewed the District's written response provided to PDE, interviewed District personnel, and performed audit procedures as detailed in each status section below.

Auditor General Performance Audit Report Released on June 26, 2014

Prior Finding: The District Lacks Sufficient Internal Controls Over Its Student **Record Data**

Prior Finding Summary: Our prior review of the student data reports submitted to PDE for the 2009-10, 2010-11, and 2011-12 school years noted that the District lacked sufficient controls over data integrity. Specifically, the District did not resolve errors between reports generated by the Pennsylvania Information Management System (PIMS) and the District's Student Information System (SIS) prior to submission to PDE.

Prior Recommendations: We recommended that the District should:

- 1. Verify resident and nonresident membership throughout the year and retain proper documentation to support all membership.
- 2. Print out the SIS membership reports and PIMS reports after the PIMS upload is completed and perform reconciliations between the District's child accounting software data and the PIMS reports, and retain all documentation for audit purposes.
- 3. Submit error reports when needed and retain them for future audits.
- 4. Develop documented procedures (e.g., procedure manuals, policies, or other written instructions) and cross-train individuals so they are familiar with PDE's child accounting reporting requirements and PIMS reporting procedures in the event of a sudden change in personnel.

Current Status:

During our current review, we found that the District implemented our prior audit recommendations. The District began reconciling their membership data with the PIMS information during the 2014-15 school year. The District also developed procedures regarding membership data and cross-trained employees during the 2014-15 school year.
