Dear Mr. Caputo and Mr. Yeager:

We conducted a Limited Procedures Engagement (LPE) of the Southern Columbia Area School District (District) to determine its compliance with certain relevant state laws, regulations, policies, and administrative procedures (relevant requirements). The LPE covers the period July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2016, except for any areas of compliance that may have required an alternative to this period. The engagement was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. §§ 402 and 403), but was not conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

As we conducted our LPE procedures, we sought to determine answers to the following questions, which serve as our LPE objectives:

- Did the District have documented board policies and administrative procedures related to the following?
 - Internal controls
 - o Budgeting practices
 - o The Right-to-Know Law
 - o The Sunshine Act
- Were the policies and procedures adequate and appropriate, and have they been properly implemented?
- Did the District comply with the relevant requirements in the Right-to-Know Law and the Sunshine Act?
- Did the District take appropriate corrective action to address the finding made in our prior audit?


Academic Information


The following table and charts consist of School Performance Profile (SPP) scores and Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) results for the entire District obtained from PDE's data files. These scores are presented in the District's audit report for **informational purposes only**, and they were not audited by our Department.

SPP benchmarks represent the statewide average of all district school buildings in the Commonwealth.² PSSA benchmarks and goals are determined by PDE each school year and apply to all public school entities.³ District SPP and PSSA scores were calculated using an average of all of the individual school buildings within the District. Scores below SPP statewide averages and PSSA benchmarks/goals are presented in red.

² Statewide averages for SPP scores were calculated based on all district school buildings throughout the Commonwealth, excluding charter and cyber charter schools.

³ PSSA benchmarks apply to all district school buildings, charters, and cyber charters. In the 2011-12 school year, the state benchmarks reflect the Adequate Yearly Progress targets established under No Child Left Behind. In the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, the state benchmarks reflect the statewide goals based on annual measurable objectives established by PDE.

⁴ The following letter grades are based on a 0-100 point system: A (90-100), B (80-89), C (70-79), D (60-69), F (59 or below).



4 Year Cohort Graduation Rates

The cohort graduation rates are a calculation of the percentage of students who have graduated with a regular high school diploma within a designated number of years since the student first entered high school. The rate is determined for a cohort of students who have all entered high school for the first time during the same school year.⁶

Status of Prior Audit Findings and Observations

Our prior audit of the District released on May 15, 2014, resulted in one finding, as shown below. As part of our current engagement, we determined the status of corrective action taken by the District to implement our prior audit recommendations. We interviewed District personnel and performed audit procedures as detailed in the status section below.

Auditor General Performance Audit Report Released on May 15, 2014

Prior Finding: Membership Reporting Errors and a Lack of Internal Controls

Resulted in the District Not Receiving Their Entitled

Reimbursement

Prior Finding Summary: During our prior audit of the District, we reviewed student

membership reports submitted to PDE for the 2010-11 and 2011-12 school years. During this review, we found reporting errors, as well as a lack of internal controls, which resulted in a net underpayment to the

District of \$31,402.

Prior Recommendations: We recommended that the District should:

- 1. Establish internal controls that include reconciliations of the data that is uploaded to Pennsylvania Information Management System (PIMS).
- 2. Verify that the Preliminary Reports from PDE are correct and, if not correct, revise and resubmit child accounting data so that the Final Reports from PDE are correct.
- 3. Review subsequent year reports and, if errors are found, submit revised reports to PDE.

We also recommended that PDE should:

4. Revise all reports that have been incorrectly completed and adjust District reimbursement affected by the error.

Current Status:

During our current engagement, we found the District did implement our prior recommendations. The District established internal controls that include reconciliations of the data that is uploaded to PIMS and verifies that preliminary reports from PDE are correct. Also, the District reviewed subsequent year reports (2012-13 through 2015-16), and no errors were identified. As of June 7, 2017, PDE has not resolved the \$31,402 underpayment. Therefore, we again recommend

PDE adjust the District's subsidy to resolve the outstanding underpayment of \$31,402.
