Dear Mr. Bollman and Mr. Martin:

We conducted a Limited Procedures Engagement (LPE) of the Tussey Mountain School District (District) to determine its compliance with certain relevant state laws, regulations, policies, and administrative procedures (relevant requirements). The LPE covers the period July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2016, except for any areas of compliance that may have required an alternative to this period. The engagement was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. §§ 402 and 403), but was not conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

As we conducted our LPE procedures, we sought to determine answers to the following questions, which serve as our LPE objectives:

- Did the District have documented board policies and administrative procedures related to the following?
 - o Internal controls
 - Budgeting practices
 - The Right-to-Know Law
 - The Sunshine Act
- Were the policies and procedures adequate and appropriate, and have they been properly implemented?
- Did the District comply with the relevant requirements in the Right-to-Know Law and the Sunshine Act?
- Did the District take appropriate corrective action to address the finding made in our prior audit?








Note: General Fund Balance is comprised of the District's Committed, Assigned and Unassigned Fund Balances.




Academic Information

The following table and charts consist of School Performance Profile (SPP) scores and Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) results for the entire District obtained from PDE's data files.¹ These scores are presented in the District's audit report for **informational purposes only**, and they were not audited by our Department.

SPP benchmarks represent the statewide average of all district school buildings in the Commonwealth.² PSSA benchmarks and goals are determined by PDE each school year and apply to all public school entities.³ District SPP and PSSA scores were calculated using an average of all of the individual school buildings within the District. Scores below SPP statewide averages and PSSA benchmarks/goals are presented in red.

In the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, the state benchmarks reflect the statewide goals based on annual measurable objectives established by PDE.



4 Year Cohort Graduation Rates

The cohort graduation rates are a calculation of the percentage of students who have graduated with a regular high school diploma within a designated number of years since the student first entered high school. The rate is determined for a cohort of students who have all entered high school for the first time during the same school year.⁶

Status of Prior Audit Findings and Observations

Our prior audit of the District released on November 15, 2013, resulted in one finding, as shown below. As part of our current engagement, we determined the status of corrective action taken by the District to implement our prior audit recommendations. We reviewed the District's written response provided to PDE, interviewed District personnel, and performed audit procedures as detailed in each status section below.

Prior Finding:	Errors in Reporting Pupil Membership Data Resulted in a Net Tuition Underpayment Totaling \$14,670					
Prior Finding Summary:	During our prior audit, we found student membership reports submitted to PDE by the District for years ending June 30, 2010, and June 30, 2011, contained errors in the reporting of pupil membership days for children placed in private homes (foster students).					
Prior Recommendations:	Our prior audit finding recommended that the District should:					
	1. Adopt internal controls over the child accounting collection and reporting.					
	2. Thoroughly review all child accounting data for accuracy prior to submission to PDE.					
	3. Perform a detailed review of PDE's Preliminary Summary of Child Accounting report to ensure accurate reporting of pupils.					
	4. Review subsequent year Pennsylvania Information Management System (PIMS) reports for errors and resubmit to PDE, if necessary.					
	We also recommended that PDE should:					
	5. Adjust future District allocations to correct the net underpayment of \$14,670.					
Current Status:	During our current review, we found the District has implemented the recommendations from our prior audit. The District has established internal controls that include reconciliation of data uploaded to PIMS prior to submission. District officials responsible for PIMS entry and submission of PIMS data to PDE have been provided training on these subjects. In addition, the District continues to obtain and reconcile agency letters to ensure the foster students are properly classified. The

District reviewed subsequent years of membership reports submitted to PDE and did not find errors. However, as of the last day of our current review, April 19, 2017, PDE has not implemented our recommendation. We again recommend that PDE makes adjustments to future allocations to correct the \$14,670 underpayment.
