We have conducted a compliance audit of the Bethel Township Police Pension Plan for the period January 1, 2017 to December 31, 2021. We also evaluated compliance with some requirements subsequent to that period when possible. The audit was conducted pursuant to authority derived from the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (Act 205 of 1984, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.402(j)), which requires the Auditor General, as deemed necessary, to audit every municipality which receives general municipal pension system state aid and every municipal pension plan and fund in which general municipal pension system state aid is deposited. The audit was not conducted, nor was it required to be, in accordance with Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. We planned and performed the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our finding and conclusions based on our audit objective.

The objective of the audit was to determine if the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies.

Our audit was limited to the areas related to the objective identified above. To determine whether the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies, our methodology included the following:

• We determined whether state aid was properly determined and deposited in accordance with Act 205 requirements by verifying the annual deposit date of state aid and determining whether deposits were made within 30 days of receipt for all years within the period under audit.

- We determined whether annual employer contributions were calculated and deposited in accordance with the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations by examining the municipality's calculation of the plan's annual financial requirements and minimum municipal obligation (MMO) and comparing these calculated amounts to amounts actually budgeted and deposited into the pension plan as evidenced by supporting documentation.
- We determined that there were no employee contributions required by the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations for the years covered by our audit period.
- We determined that there were no benefit calculations prepared for the years covered by our audit period.
- We determined whether the January 1, 2017, January 1, 2019, and January 1, 2021 actuarial valuation reports were prepared and submitted by March 31, 2018, 2020, and 2022, respectively, in accordance with Act 205 and whether selected information provided on these reports is accurate, complete, and in accordance with plan provisions to ensure compliance for participation in the state aid program by comparing selected information to supporting source documentation.

Bethel Township contracted with an independent certified public accounting firm for annual audits of its basic financial statements for the years ended December 31, 2017, 2018, 2019, and 2020 which are available at the township's offices. Those financial statements were not audited by us and, accordingly, we express no opinion or other form of assurance on them.

Township officials are responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal controls to provide reasonable assurance that the Bethel Township Police Pension Plan is administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies. As previously described, we tested transactions, interviewed selected officials, and performed procedures to the extent necessary to provide reasonable assurance of detecting instances of noncompliance with legal and regulatory requirements or noncompliance with provisions of contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies that are significant within the context of the audit objective.

The results of our procedures indicated that, in all significant respects, the Bethel Township Police Pension Plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies, except as noted in the following finding further discussed later in this report:

Finding – Return Of Unused Monies To The Commonwealth

The accompanying supplementary information is presented for purposes of additional analysis. We did not audit the information or conclude on it and, accordingly, express no form of assurance on it.

The contents of this report were discussed with officials of Bethel Township and, where appropriate, their responses have been included in the report. We would like to thank township officials for the cooperation extended to us during the conduct of the audit.

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BACKGROUND

On December 18, 1984, the Pennsylvania Legislature adopted the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (P.L. 1005, No. 205, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.101 <u>et seq</u>.). The Act established mandatory actuarial reporting and funding requirements and a uniform basis for the distribution of state aid to Pennsylvania's public pension plans.

Annual state aid allocations are provided from a 2 percent foreign (out-of-state) casualty insurance premium tax, a portion of the foreign (out-of-state) fire insurance tax designated for paid firefighters and any investment income earned on the collection of these taxes. Generally, municipal pension plans established prior to December 18, 1984, are eligible for state aid. For municipal pension plans established after that date, the sponsoring municipality must fund the plan for three plan years before it becomes eligible for state aid. In accordance with Act 205, a municipality's annual state aid allocation cannot exceed its actual pension costs.

In addition to Act 205, the Bethel Township Police Pension Plan is also governed by implementing regulations published at Title 16, Part IV of the Pennsylvania Code and applicable provisions of various other state statutes, including, but not limited to the following:

- Act 69 The Second Class Township Code, Act of May 1, 1933 (P.L. 103, No. 69), as reenacted and amended, 53 P.S. § 65101 et seq.
- Act 120 Foreign Casualty Insurance Premium Tax Allocation Law, Act of May 12, 1943 (P.L. 259, No. 120), as amended, 72 P.S. § 2263.1 et seq.

The Bethel Township Police Pension Plan is a single-employer defined benefit pension plan locally controlled by the provisions of Ordinance No. 51288, as amended, adopted pursuant to Act 69. The plan was established May 1, 1973. As of December 31, 2021, the plan had no active members, no terminated members eligible for vested benefits in the future, and no retirees receiving pension benefits.

BETHEL TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN FINDING AND RECOMMENDATION

Finding - Return Of Unused Monies To The Commonwealth

<u>Condition</u>: Bethel Township has not employed a full-time paid police officer since 2003. In addition, there are no terminated members eligible for vested benefits in the future or retirees receiving pension benefits from the pension plan. However, as of December 31, 2021, the township has retained assets in its police pension plan amounting to \$879,361, which includes unused state aid allocated under Act 205 intended for pension purposes.

Criteria: Act 205, at Section 402(g), directs that:

Any general municipal pension system State aid received by a municipality shall, only be used to defray the cost of the pension plan or pension plans maintained in the municipality...

Furthermore, Section 402(j) authorizes the Auditor General to administer the General Municipal Pension State Aid Program. This administrative power necessarily extends to ensuring that state aid is both allocated and used in accordance with the act. It has been the consistent practice of this department that municipalities that have received state aid under this program, and which do not employ at least one full-time paid police officer, must return unused funds not used for the purposes set forth herein within two years after receipt thereof, to the Commonwealth for distribution.

<u>Cause</u>: Current plan officials were unsure of the proper disposition of the unused funds maintained in the township's pension plan or their responsibility to return any unused state aid allocation under Act 205 intended for pension purposes pursuant to the aforementioned criteria, to the Commonwealth.

<u>Effect</u>: Funds distributed under the General Municipality Pension System State Aid Program are not being used for their intended statutory purpose and have not been returned to the Commonwealth for redistribution to defray other eligible municipalities' pension costs under the program.

Furthermore, the township's future state aid allocations may be withheld until the finding recommendation is complied with.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that township officials, with the assistance of their solicitor and the plan's actuary, identify any outstanding liabilities that need to be satisfied from the pension plan assets. We also recommend that township officials account for any municipal contributions previously made to fund the pension plan and transfer such unused municipal contributions to the general fund.

BETHEL TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN FINDING AND RECOMMENDATION

Finding – (Continued)

After accounting for any remaining liabilities and municipal contributions, the remaining police pension plan assets should be returned to the Commonwealth. A check, along with any applicable calculations used in determining the amount reimbursed, should be made payable to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and submitted to: Department of the Auditor General, Municipal Pensions & Fire Relief Programs Unit, 321 Finance Building, Harrisburg, PA 17120.

Management's Response: The township provided the following response:

Please be advised that Bethel Township is rapidly growing with commercial/manufacturing businesses and a recently constructed income-based housing development We strongly believe Bethel Township will be forced to hire a police force in the near future.

<u>Auditor's Conclusion</u>: We acknowledge the township's position; however, based on the aforementioned criteria cited above, the finding remains as stated. Compliance will be evaluated during our next audit of the plan.

BETHEL TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN POTENTIAL WITHHOLD OF STATE AID

A condition such as that reported by the finding contained in this audit report may lead to a total withholding of state aid in the future unless that finding is corrected. However, such action will not be considered if sufficient written documentation is provided to verify compliance with this department's recommendation. BETHEL TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION (UNAUDITED)

As of the January 1, 2015, 2017, 2019, and 2021 valuation dates, the borough filed actuarial valuation report Form Type A, Situation 2 indicating that the Municipality maintains a pension fund to provide pension or retirement benefits for municipal employees of the type indicated, but no active, vested, or retired employees exist at the present time. Therefore, there is no required supplementary information relative to this pension plan.
