We have conducted a compliance audit of the Falls Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan for the period January 1, 2018 to December 31, 2021. We also evaluated compliance with some requirements subsequent to that period when possible. The audit was conducted pursuant to authority derived from the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (Act 205 of 1984, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.402(j)), which requires the Auditor General, as deemed necessary, to audit every municipality which receives general municipal pension system state aid and every municipal pension plan and fund in which general municipal pension system state aid is deposited. The audit was not conducted, nor was it required to be, in accordance with Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. We planned and performed the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our conclusions based on our audit objective. We believe that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for our conclusions based on our audit objective.

The objective of the audit was to determine if the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies.

Our audit was limited to the areas related to the objective identified above. To determine whether the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies, our methodology included the following:

We determined whether state aid was properly determined and deposited in accordance with Act 205 requirements by verifying the annual deposit date of state aid and determining whether deposits were made within 30 days of receipt for all years within the period under audit.

- We determined whether annual employer contributions were calculated and deposited in accordance with the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations by examining the municipality's calculation of the plan's annual financial requirements and minimum municipal obligation (MMO) and comparing these calculated amounts to amounts actually budgeted and deposited into the pension plan as evidenced by supporting documentation. Employer contributions that were deposited into the pension plan for the years ended December 31, 2016 to December 31, 2021, are presented on the Summary of Deposited State Aid and Employer Contributions.
- We determined that there were no employee contributions required by the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations for the years covered by our audit period.
- We determined whether retirement benefits calculated for plan members who retired or received a lump-sum distribution during the current audit period represent payments to all (and only) those entitled to receive them and were properly determined and disbursed in accordance with the plan's governing document, applicable laws, and regulations by comparing the distributed amounts to supporting documentation evidencing amounts determined and actually paid to the recipients.
- We determined whether the January 1, 2017, January 1, 2019, and January 1, 2021 actuarial valuation reports were prepared and submitted by March 31, 2018, 2020, and 2022, respectively, in accordance with Act 205 and whether selected information provided on these reports is accurate, complete, and in accordance with plan provisions to ensure compliance for participation in the state aid program by comparing selected information to supporting source documentation.

Falls Township contracted with an independent certified public accounting firm for annual audits of its basic financial statements for the years ending December 31, 2018, 2019, and 2020, which are available at the township's offices. Those financial statements were not audited by us and, accordingly, we express no opinion or other form of assurance on them.

Township officials are responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal controls to provide reasonable assurance that the Falls Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan is administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies. As previously described, we tested transactions, interviewed selected officials, and performed procedures to the extent necessary to provide reasonable assurance of detecting instances of noncompliance with legal and regulatory requirements or noncompliance with provisions of contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies that are significant within the context of the audit objective.

The results of our procedures indicated that, in all significant respects, the Falls Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies.

The contents of this report were discussed with officials of Falls Township and, where appropriate, their responses have been included in the report. We would like to thank township officials for the cooperation extended to us during the conduct of the audit.

BACKGROUND

On December 18, 1984, the Pennsylvania Legislature adopted the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (P.L. 1005, No. 205, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.101 et seq.). The Act established mandatory actuarial reporting and funding requirements and a uniform basis for the distribution of state aid to Pennsylvania's public pension plans.

Annual state aid allocations are provided from a 2 percent foreign (out-of-state) casualty insurance premium tax, a portion of the foreign (out-of-state) fire insurance tax designated for paid firefighters and any investment income earned on the collection of these taxes. Generally, municipal pension plans established prior to December 18, 1984, are eligible for state aid. For municipal pension plans established after that date, the sponsoring municipality must fund the plan for three plan years before it becomes eligible for state aid. In accordance with Act 205, a municipality's annual state aid allocation cannot exceed its actual pension costs.

In addition to Act 205, the Falls Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan is also governed by implementing regulations published at Title 16, Part IV of the Pennsylvania Code and applicable provisions of various other state statutes.

The Falls Township Non-Uniformed Pension Plan is a single-employer defined contribution pension plan locally controlled by the provisions of Resolution No. 87-2. The plan is also affected by the provisions of collective bargaining agreements between the township and its non-uniformed employees. The plan was established January 5, 1987. Active members are not required to contribute to the plan. The municipality is required to contribute 5 percent of each member's salary. As of December 31, 2021, the plan had 14 active members, 19 terminated members eligible for vested benefits in the future, and 6 retirees receiving pension benefits.

Effective January 1, 2021, the township's management employees and AFSCME union employees transferred from this non-uniformed defined contribution plan to the Falls Township Non-Uniformed (cash balance) Employee's Pension Plan, and in April 2021, those employees' account balances were transferred from the defined contribution plan to the cash balance plan. All new hires (both management and union) will participate in the non-uniformed cash balance pension plan, and the only active members remaining in this non-uniformed defined contribution pension plan are part-time crossing guards. As such, this report represents the final audit of the non-uniformed defined contribution plan.

FALLS TOWNSHIP NON-UNIFORMED PENSION PLAN STATUS OF PRIOR AUDIT RECOMMENDATION

Status Of Prior Audit Recommendation

· Ineligible Employees Participating In Pension Plan

As disclosed in the prior eight audit reports, the collective bargaining agreements between the township and its non-uniformed employees inappropriately allow part-time school crossing guards to participate in the township's non-uniformed pension plan, which is not authorized by Act 69. Municipal officials have not been successful in removing this provision from the collective bargaining agreements up to and including the latest collective bargaining agreement covering the period January 1, 2018 to December 31, 2021.

During the current and prior audit periods, since the township received its state aid allocations based on unit value for its pension plans, it did not receive allocations attributable to the part-time school crossing guards being included in the pension plan. The Department will continue to monitor the effect of the ineligible employees participating in the pension plan on the township's future state aid allocations, which may require the township to reimburse any excess state aid received attributable to the participation of the ineligible employees to the Commonwealth.
