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LEBANON COUNTY LIQUID FUELS TAX FUND AND ACT 44 TAX FUND BACKGROUND FOR THE TWO YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2009

Background

The Vehicle Code makes provisions and provides funding for County Liquid Fuels and Act 44 Programs. The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation has regulatory administration and oversight of the funds supporting these county programs. Counties are required to comply with those provisions and to report annually.

The Vehicle Code imposes a state tax on liquid fuels and fuels used or sold and delivered by distributors within the Commonwealth (75 Pa. C.S. § 9004(a)). One-half cent of the tax collected on each gallon of liquid fuels is deposited in the Commonwealth's Liquid Fuels Tax Fund. The Vehicle Code further provides for the disposition and use of this tax, including the allocations to counties in June and December of each year to fund construction, reconstruction, maintenance and repair of county roads, streets and bridges. The allocation to the respective counties is made in the ratio that the average amount returned to each county during the three preceding years bears to the average amount returned to all counties during the three preceding years (75 Pa C.S. § 9010).

The Vehicle Code, as recently amended by Act 44 of 2007 (July 18, 2007, P.L.169), requires the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission to make annual contributions for the benefit of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation's Motor License Fund, and further requires the Department of Transportation to distribute \$5,000,000 of the annual contribution to counties (75 Pa. C.S. § 8915.6). The annual distribution to counties is determined based upon the ratio of square footage of deck area of a county's county-owned bridges to the total square footage of deck area of a county's county-owned bridges is required as part of the National Bridge Inspection Standards Program.



<u>Independent Auditor's Report</u>

We examined the accompanying Forms MS-991 With Adjustments for the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund and the Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund With Adjustments of Lebanon County for the two years ended December 31, 2009. The county's management is responsible for the Forms MS-991 and the Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the Forms MS-991 With Adjustments and the Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund With Adjustments based on our examination.

Our examination was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the standards applicable to attestation engagements contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. An examination includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting Lebanon County's Forms MS-991 and Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund for the two years ended December 31, 2009 and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We believe that our examination provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

We are mandated by Section 403 of *The Fiscal Code*, 72 P.S. § 403, to audit each county's Liquid Fuels Tax Fund to ensure that funds received are expended in accordance with applicable laws and regulations. *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States include attestation engagements as a separate type of audit. An attestation engagement performed pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards* involves additional standards that exceed the standards provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Accordingly, this attestation engagement complies with both *Government Auditing Standards* and Section 403 of *The Fiscal Code*.

As described in Note 4, the adjustments included on the Forms MS-991 With Adjustments are made by the Department of the Auditor General.

As discussed in Finding No. 1, the county expended \$271,529.40 for project No. C-06-38000-47. However, a Final Completion Report Form MS-999 was not filed with the Department of Transportation as of the date of this report. Additionally, as discussed in Finding No. 2, the county's unencumbered balance as of December 31, 2009 was greater than the receipts for the previous twelve months by \$190,120.40. Therefore, the county may be required to distribute \$190,120.40 to the political subdivisions within the county.

<u>Independent Auditor's Report (Continued)</u>

In our opinion, except for the matters discussed in the preceding paragraph, the Forms MS-991 With Adjustments and the Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund With Adjustments present, in all material respects, the information required by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation for the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund and Act 44 Tax Fund of Lebanon County for the two years ended December 31, 2009, in conformity with the criteria set forth in Note 1.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we are required to report findings of significant deficiencies in internal control, violations of provisions of contracts or grant agreements, and abuse that are material to the Forms MS-991 and the Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund and any fraud and illegal acts that are more than inconsequential that come to our attention during our examination. We are also required to obtain the views of management on those matters. We performed our examination to express an opinion on whether the Forms MS-991 and the Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund are presented in accordance with the criteria described above and not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the internal control over reporting on the Forms MS-991 and the Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund or on compliance and other matters; accordingly, we express no such opinions.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects Lebanon County's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report data reliably in accordance with the applicable criteria such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of Lebanon County's Forms MS-991 and the Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by Lebanon County's internal control.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency or combination of significant deficiencies that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the Forms MS-991 and the Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund will not be prevented or detected by Lebanon County's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control over reporting on the Forms MS-991 and the Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. We did not identify any significant deficiencies or material weaknesses, as defined above, in internal control over reporting on the Forms MS-991 and the Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund.

Independent Auditor's Report (Continued)

The results of our tests disclosed the following instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*:

- Failure To Timely Submit Final Completion Report.
- Unencumbered Balance As Of December 31, 2009 Was Greater Than Receipts For The Previous Twelve Months.

We are concerned in light of the county's failure to correct a previously reported finding regarding the failure to timely submit a Final Completion Report for project No. C-06-38000-47. During our current examination the county failed to timely submit a Final Completion Report for project No. C-06-38000-47 and its unencumbered balance as of December 31, 2009 was greater than receipts for the previous twelve months. The county should strive to implement the recommendations and corrective actions noted in this report.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation and the management of Lebanon County and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

LEBANON COUNTY LIQUID FUELS TAX FUND NOTES TO FORMS MS-991 AND REPORTS OF ACT 44 TAX FUND WITH ADJUSTMENTS FOR THE TWO YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2009

1. Criteria

- A. *The Vehicle Code* prescribes criteria for liquid fuels program funds (75 Pa C.S. § 9010). The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation's *Publication 9* provides more specific policies and procedures to counties for the administration and reporting of the liquid fuels program funds. In the event of any discrepancies between the two, the legislation governs.
 - (1) Funds received by the counties must be deposited in a special fund designated as the County Liquid Fuels Tax Fund and no other money may be deposited and commingled. Money should be invested to earn interest until expended.
 - For purposes of payments under (2), below, the county may borrow and place in the special fund money not in excess of the liquid fuels tax funds to be received during the current calendar year.
 - (2) Payments from the special fund may be used for:
 - construction, reconstruction, maintenance and repair of roads, highways, bridges
 and curb ramps from a road or highway to provide for access by individuals with
 disabilities consistent with Federal and State law;
 - property damages and compensation of viewers for services in eminent domain proceedings involving roads, highways, and bridges;
 - construction, reconstruction, operation and maintenance of publicly owned ferryboat operations;
 - interest and principal payments on road, bridge, or publicly owned ferryboat operation bonds or sinking fund charges;
 - acquisition, maintenance, repair and operation of traffic signs and signals;
 - erection and maintenance of stop and go signal lights, blinkers and other like traffic control devices;
 - indirect costs, including benefit costs, overhead and other administrative charges for those county employees directly engaged in eligible projects, not to exceed 10 percent of the yearly allocation to the county; and

1. <u>Criteria (Continued)</u>

- individual vehicle liability insurance for equipment purchased under the fund, not to exceed 10 percent of the yearly allocation to the county.
- (3) Counties may not make expenditures from the special fund for new construction on roads, bridges, curb ramps, or publicly owned ferryboat operations without the approval of the plans for construction by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation. And, counties may not allocate money from the special fund to political subdivisions within the county until the application and the contracts or plans for the proposed expenditures have been made on a form prescribed by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation.
- (4) Counties may encumber current funds for future road and bridge construction, reconstruction, and maintenance projects including viable municipal projects. Counties must redistribute any unencumbered balance in the special fund to political subdivisions if the unencumbered balance is more than the county's receipts during the preceding twelve month period.
- (5) Counties must submit a report to the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation by January 15 for the period ending December 31 on prescribed Form MS-991, The Report of County Liquid Fuels Tax Fund, showing the receipts and expenditures of the money received by the county from the Commonwealth. Upon failure to file the report or instances of any non-compliant payments, allocations, or expenditures, the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation will withhold further funding until the delinquent report is filed, the money is allocated, or the expenditures for the prior 12 months are approved.
- B. *The Vehicle Code*, as recently amended by Act 44 of 2007 (July 18, 2007, P.L. 169), prescribes the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation with oversight authority of the Act 44 funds distributed to the counties from the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission's annual contribution of \$5,000,000 to the Commonwealth's Motor License Fund. The County's Act 44 Tax Fund is used to account for the distribution made to the county from the Department of Transportation and the payments made for construction and maintenance of county-owned bridges.

Basis Of Presentation

In accordance with reporting requirements prescribed by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, the Report of County Liquid Fuels Tax Fund With Adjustments and the

1. Criteria (Continued)

Reports of Act 44 Tax Fund With Adjustments do not constitute complete financial presentations of the county's assets, liabilities, expenses, and fund balance but include the receipts, expenditures, and fund balances of the County Liquid Fuels Tax Fund and the County Act 44 Tax Fund, respectively.

The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation prescribes that the county report the following on the MS-991 form, *Report of County Liquid Fuels Tax Fund*:

- A. The balance in the County Liquid Fuels Tax Fund at the beginning of the report calendar year.
- B. Receipts which must be itemized and include interest, reimbursable agreements, and miscellaneous items such as loans, sale of salvageable material, and damage claims to road or bridge property.

Refer to the related Notes: Note 3, Interest Earnings; Note 5, Reimbursable Agreements; and Note 6, Miscellaneous Receipts

- C. Accounts receivable (to be realized within 60 days of the year end).
- D. Total Liquid Fuels Tax funds available for expenditure and encumbrances.
- E. Expenditures for county-owned roads, highways, and bridges.
- F. Accounts payable (accrued wages, accrued payroll taxes, and accounts payable vendors to be realized within 60 days of the year end).
- G. The balance in the fund at the close of the report calendar year.
- H. Encumbered and unencumbered balances on hand at the close of the report calendar year.

Refer to Note 7, Encumbrances.

2. <u>Deposits</u>

The County Code, Title 16 P.S § 17067, authorizes the county to deposit its funds in the following:

- Deposits in savings accounts or time deposits, other than certificates of deposit or share accounts of institutions having their principal place of business in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) or other like insurance. For any amount above the insured maximum, the depository shall pledge approved collateral.
- Certificates of deposit from institutions having their principal place of business in or outside the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania that are insured by the FDIC or other like insurance. For any amounts in excess of the insured maximum, such deposits shall be collateralized by a pledge or assignment of assets. Certificates of deposit may not exceed 20 percent of a bank's total capital surplus or 20 percent of a savings and loan's or savings bank's assets minus liabilities.

Deposits consist of receipts and deposits in a financial institution. Pennsylvania statutes require all deposits to be insured and, for any amount above the insured maximum, to be secured with approved collateral as defined.

There were no deposits exposed to custodial credit risk as of December 31, 2009. Custodial credit risk, as defined by GASB No. 40, includes deposits that are not covered by depository insurance and the deposits are uncollateralized, collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution, or collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent but not in the county's name.

3. <u>Interest Earnings</u>

Our examination disclosed that the county deposited idle liquid fuels tax money in an interest-bearing account which earned \$5,519.29 during 2008, and \$6,068.48 during 2009, thus providing additional funds for road maintenance and repairs.

Additionally, the county deposited idle Act 44 tax money in an interest-bearing account which earned \$259.01 during 2008, and \$875.55 during 2009, thus providing additional funds for road maintenance and repairs.

4. Adjustments

2008 Form MS-991

Adjustments were made to "Reimbursable agreements" and "Miscellaneous" because receipts of \$33,283.91 were misclassified.

An adjustment of \$(160,000.00) was made to "Unpaid encumbrances" because the county incorrectly reported a balance for encumbrance No. C-06-38000-47, which was completed during 2007.

2009 Forms MS-991

Adjustments were made to "Reimbursable agreements" and "Miscellaneous" because receipts of \$92,234.72 were misclassified.

An adjustment of \$(154,888.00) was made to "Unpaid encumbrances" because the balances for the following encumbrances were reported incorrectly:

5. Reimbursable Agreements

During our examination, we noted that the county entered into reimbursement agreements with the Department of Transportation for bridge maintenance and inspections. During our current examination period, the county received \$33,283.91 in 2008 and \$92,234.72 in 2009 as a result of these agreements. As of December 31, 2009, \$21,525.92 is due the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund.

6. Miscellaneous Receipts

On July 1, 2009 the county deposited \$50.00 into its Liquid Fuels Tax Fund that was received from a vendor for a reimbursement of an expenditure.

7. Encumbrances

As of December 31, 2009, \$61,134.00 was encumbered for grants to political subdivisions.

LEBANON COUNTY LIQUID FUELS TAX FUND AND REPORT OF ACT 44 TAX FUND FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE TWO YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2009

Finding No. 1 - Failure To Timely Submit Final Completion Report

Our examination disclosed that the county expended \$271,529.40 for project No. C-06-38000-47. Final payment was made on this project on July 5, 2007. A Final Completion Report Form MS-999 was not filed with the Department of Transportation as of the date of this report.

The Department of Transportation's *Publication 9* contains the policies and procedures for the administration of the Liquid Fuels Tax Fund. *Publication 9*, Chapter One, Section 1.7, Figure 1, states that Final Completion Report Form MS-999 is to be submitted to the appropriate Department of Transportation Municipal Services District Office upon completion of a project.

Because the county failed to file a Final Completion Report, we were unable to determine if the project was completed to the satisfaction of the Department of Transportation. Additionally, we were unable to determine if the county expended the approved amount of Liquid Fuels Tax Fund money on the project.

A similar finding for this project was also written in our prior report.

Recommendations

We recommend that the county reimburse \$271,529.40 to its Liquid Fuels Tax Fund upon official notification by the Department of Transportation.

We also recommend that the county submit a completed Form MS-999 to the Department of Transportation for the project.

We again recommend that, in the future, the county comply with the Department of Transportation's *Publication 9* by submitting a Final Completion Report Form MS-999 for completed projects in a timely manner.

Management's Response

The county officials stated:

The County is in the process of preparing and filing the necessary completion report for the above mentioned project. The report will be submitted in a few weeks.

Auditor's Conclusion

During our next examination we will determine if the municipality complied with our recommendations.

LEBANON COUNTY LIOUID FUELS TAX FUND AND REPORT OF ACT 44 TAX FUND FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE TWO YEARS ENDED **DECEMBER 31, 2009**

Finding No 2 - Unencumbered Balance As Of December 31, 2009 Was Greater Than Receipts For The Previous Twelve Months

All counties receive allocations of Liquid Fuels Tax Fund money in June and December of each year. Liquid Fuels Tax Fund money is primarily used for the construction, reconstruction, and maintenance and repair of roads and bridges. Counties may also choose to grant Liquid Fuels Tax Fund money to the political subdivisions within the county. Additionally, if the unencumbered fund balance as of December 31 was greater than the receipts for the previous twelve months, the county must disburse a portion of its Liquid Fuels Tax Fund money to the political subdivisions within the county. This condition is referred to as a forced distribution.

Our examination disclosed that the county's unencumbered balance as of December 31, 2009 was \$357,914.55, which was greater than the total receipts of \$335,588.30 for the preceding twelve months.

The Liquid Fuels and Fuels Tax Act, 75 Pa. C.S.A. § 9010(c) states, in part:

When the unencumbered balance in the County Liquid Fuels Tax Fund is greater than the receipts for the twelve months immediately preceding the date of either of the reports, the county commissioners shall notify the political subdivisions to make application within 90 days for participation in the redistribution of the unencumbered balance. Redistribution shall be effected within 120 days of the date of either of the reports.

In addition, the Department of Transportation's *Publication 9*, Chapter One, Section 1.9.1, states, in part:

... This forced distribution applies only to that portion of the unencumbered balance in excess of fifty percent (50%) of the receipts for the previous twelve months....

The following calculation is how to apply the above formula as it pertains to Lebanon County:

Unencumbered balance	\$357,914.55
Less 50% of prior 12 months' receipts	167,794.15
Amount to be distributed	\$190,120.40

Finding No 2 - Unencumbered Balance As Of December 31, 2009 Was Greater Than Receipts For The Previous Twelve Months (Continued)

The failure to comply with the Liquid Fuels and Fuels Tax Act and the Department of Transportation's *Publication 9* could result in the county having to distribute \$190,120.40 to the political subdivisions within the county.

Recommendation

Pursuant to the review of the Department of Transportation, we recommend that the Commissioners of Lebanon County distribute \$190,120.40 to the political subdivisions within the county in accordance with the provision of the Liquid Fuels and Fuels Tax Act and the Department of Transportation's *Publication 9*.

Management's Response

The county officials stated:

We agree with the finding.

Auditor's Conclusion
