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#### BACKGROUND

On December 18, 1984, the Pennsylvania Legislature adopted the Municipal Pension Plan Funding Standard and Recovery Act (P.L. 1005, No. 205, as amended, 53 P.S. § 895.101 <u>et seq.</u>). The act established mandatory actuarial reporting and funding requirements and a uniform basis for the distribution of state aid to Pennsylvania's public pension plans. Section 402(j) of Act 205 specifically requires the Auditor General, as deemed necessary, to make an audit of every municipality which receives general municipal pension system State aid and of every municipal pension plan and fund in which general municipal pension system State aid is deposited.

Pension plan aid is provided from a 2 percent foreign casualty insurance premium tax, a portion of the foreign fire insurance tax designated for paid firefighters and any investment income earned on the collection of these taxes. Generally, municipal pension plans established prior to December 18, 1984, are eligible for state aid. For municipal pension plans established after that date, the sponsoring municipality must fund the plan for three plan years before it becomes eligible for state aid. In accordance with Act 205, a municipality's annual state aid allocation cannot exceed its actual pension costs.

In addition to Act 205, the Shaler Township Police Pension Plan is also governed by implementing regulations adopted by the Public Employee Retirement Commission published at Title 16, Part IV of the Pennsylvania Code and applicable provisions of various other state statutes including, but not limited to, the following:

Act 600 - Police Pension Fund Act, Act of May 29, 1956 (P.L. 1804, No. 600), as amended, 53 P.S. § 761 et seq.

The Shaler Township Police Pension Plan is a single-employer defined benefit pension plan locally controlled by the provisions of Ordinance No. 1854, adopted pursuant to Act 600. The plan is also affected by the provisions of collective bargaining agreements between the township and its police officers.

We have conducted a compliance audit of the Shaler Township Police Pension Plan for the period January 1, 2009, to December 31, 2011. The audit was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Section 402(j) of Act 205 and in accordance with the standards applicable to performance audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our audit objective. We believe that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our audit objective.

The objective of the audit was to determine if the pension plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies.

Our audit was limited to the areas related to the objective identified above. Our methodology addressed determinations about the following:

- Whether state aid was properly determined and deposited in accordance with Act 205 requirements.
- Whether employer contributions are determined and deposited in accordance with the plan's governing document and applicable laws and regulations.
- Whether employee contributions are required and, if so, are determined, deducted and deposited into the pension plan and are in accordance with the plan provisions and applicable laws and regulations.
- Whether benefit payments, if any, represent payments to all (and only) those entitled to receive them and are properly determined in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.

- Whether obligations for plan benefits are accurately determined in accordance with plan provisions and based on complete and accurate participant data; and whether actuarial valuation reports are prepared and submitted to the Public Employee Retirement Commission (PERC) in accordance with state law and selected information provided on these reports is accurate, complete and in accordance with plan provisions to ensure compliance for participation in the state aid program.
- Whether the special ad hoc postretirement adjustment granted to eligible pensioners is in accordance with applicable laws and regulations and whether the ad hoc reimbursement received by the municipality was treated in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.
- Whether benefit payments have only been made to living recipients, based on the Social Security numbers found in the pension records for retirees and beneficiaries.
- Whether refunds are made to eligible members in accordance with the plan provisions and applicable laws and regulations.

Shaler Township contracted with an independent certified public accounting firm for annual audits of its basic financial statements which are available at the township's offices. Those financial statements were not audited by us and, accordingly, we express no opinion or other form of assurance on them.

Township officials are responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal controls to provide reasonable assurance that the Shaler Township Police Pension Plan is administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies. In conducting our audit, we obtained an understanding of the township's internal controls as they relate to the township's compliance with those requirements and that we considered to be significant within the context of our audit objective, and assessed whether those significant controls were properly designed and implemented. Additionally, we tested transactions, assessed official actions, performed analytical procedures and interviewed selected officials to provide reasonable assurance of detecting instances of noncompliance with legal and regulatory requirements or noncompliance with provisions of contracts, administrative procedures, and policies that are significant within the context of the audit objective.

The results of our tests indicated that, in all significant respects, the Shaler Township Police Pension Plan was administered in compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, contracts, administrative procedures, and local ordinances and policies, except as noted in the following findings further discussed later in this report:

The accompanying supplementary information is presented for purposes of additional analysis. We did not audit the information or conclude on it and, accordingly, express no form of assurance on it.

The contents of this report were discussed with officials of Shaler Township and, where appropriate, their responses have been included in the report.

#### SHALER TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN STATUS OF PRIOR FINDING

#### Status Of Prior Audit Recommendation

#### • Pension Benefits Not In Compliance With Act 600 Provisions

The audit report for the period January 1, 2004, to December 31, 2006, contained a finding that the pension plan's governing document contained benefit provisions that conflicted with the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) between the police officers and the township and also that the plan's governing document and CBA contained benefit provisions that were not in compliance with Act 600. The audit report for the period January 1, 2007, to December 31, 2008, disclosed that the township adopted Ordinance No. 1854, which eliminated the inconsistencies with the CBA and brought the plan's benefit structure into compliance with Act 600. In addition, it was noted that both Ordinance No. 1854 and the current CBA contain a definition of salary in compliance with Act 600 for police officers hired prior to April 1, 2001, could include unused sick leave earned outside the pension computation period.

The Department continues to monitor the impact of the excess benefits being paid to retirees on the township's state aid allocations. During the current audit period, it was determined that 6 retirees are receiving pension benefits in excess of Act 600 provisions and the township received excess state aid in 2011 attributable to the excess benefits provided, as further discussed in the Findings and Recommendations section of this report.

#### SHALER TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

#### Finding No. 1 - Overpayment Of State Aid Due To The Provision Of Excess Pension Benefits

<u>Condition</u>: The township received excess state aid totaling \$22,253 in 2011 attributable to the provision of pension benefits in excess of Act 600 provisions.

<u>Criteria</u>: To the extent that the township is not in compliance with Act 600 and/or is contractually obligated to pay benefits to existing retirees in excess of those authorized by Act 600, such benefits are deemed ineligible for funding with state pension aid.

<u>Cause</u>: The plan's governing document and the CBA authorize the inclusion of unused sick leave earned outside the pension averaging period for police officers hired prior to April 1, 2001. Currently, 6 retired police officers are receiving excess benefits pursuant to this provision. Excess pension benefits must be reflected in the Act 205 actuarial valuation reports for the plan and funded in accordance with Act 205 funding standards. Because the township's state aid allocation is determined, in part, by the information contained in the plan's actuarial valuation report, the correct inclusion of excess benefits in the actuarial valuation report resulted in the allocation of excess state aid to the township in 2011 attributable to excess benefits provided.

<u>Effect</u>: The plan's actuary prepared Supplemental Actuarial Information Forms AG-MP-1 as of the January 1, 2009, and January 1, 2011, actuarial valuation dates, and determined that for the year 2011, the impact of the excess benefits on the township's state aid allocation totaled \$22,253. The excess benefits had no effect on the township's 2012 state aid allocation.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that the total excess state aid received, in the amount of \$22,253, be returned to the Commonwealth. A check in this amount, with interest compounded annually from date of receipt to date of repayment, at a rate earned by the pension plan, should be made payable to: Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and mailed to: Department of the Auditor General, Municipal Pension & Fire Relief Programs Unit, 11 Stanwix Street, Suite 1450, Pittsburgh, PA 15222. A copy of the interest calculation must be submitted along with the check.

We also recommend that the impact of the excess benefits on the township's state aid allocations in years subsequent to 2012 be determined and any overpayments be reimbursed to the Commonwealth.

Management's Response: Municipal officials agreed with the finding without exception.

#### SHALER TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

#### Finding No. 2 - Incorrect Data On Certification Form AG 385 Resulting In A Net Underpayment Of State Aid

<u>Condition</u>: The township certified 1 ineligible nonuniformed union employee (1 unit) on the 2010 Certification Form AG 385. In addition, the township understated nonuniformed payroll by \$16,372, nonuniformed union payroll by \$6,415 and understated police payroll by \$19,676 on the 2011 Certification Form AG 385. The data contained on these certification forms is based on prior calendar year information.

<u>Criteria</u>: Pursuant to Act 205, at Section 402(e)(2), an employee who has been employed on a full-time basis for at least six consecutive months and has been participating in a pension plan during the certification year is eligible for certification.

In addition, pursuant to the instructions that accompany Certification Form AG 385, the total payroll eligible to be certified should be Internal Revenue Service Form W-2 earnings pertaining to full-time positions.

<u>Cause</u>: Plan officials failed to establish adequate internal control procedures to ensure the accuracy of the data certified.

<u>Effect</u>: The data submitted on these certification forms is used, in part, to calculate the state aid due to the municipality for distribution to its pension plans. The township's 2010 state aid allocation was based on unit value. Therefore, the township received an overpayment of state aid in the amount of \$3,235 as identified below:

Since the township's 2011 state aid allocation was based on pension costs, the township received an underpayment of state aid in the amount of \$5,585 as identified below:

#### Finding No. 2 – (Continued)

Therefore, as a result of the certification errors, the township received a net underpayment of state aid during the current audit period in the amount of \$2,350.

Although the township will be reimbursed for the underpayment of state aid due to the township's certification errors, the full amount of the 2011 state aid allocation was not available to be deposited timely and therefore was not available to pay operating expenses or for investment.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that plan officials establish adequate internal control procedures to ensure compliance with the instructions that accompany Certification Form AG 385 to assist them in accurately reporting the required pension data.

Management's Response: Municipal officials agreed with the finding without exception.

#### SHALER TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN POTENTIAL WITHHOLD OF STATE AID

Finding No. 1 contained in this audit report cites an overpayment of state aid to the township in the amount of \$22,253. A condition of this nature may lead to a total withholding of state aid in the future unless that finding is corrected. A check in this amount with interest, at a rate earned by the pension plan, should be made payable to: Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and mailed to: Department of the Auditor General, Municipal Pension & Fire Relief Programs Unit, 11 Stanwix Street, Suite 1450, Pittsburgh, PA 15222.

#### SCHEDULE OF FUNDING PROGRESS

Historical trend information about the plan is presented herewith as supplementary information. It is intended to help users assess the plan's funding status on a going-concern basis, assess progress made in accumulating assets to pay benefits when due, and make comparisons with other state and local government retirement systems.

The actuarial information is required by Act 205 biennially. The historical information, beginning as of January 1, 2007, is as follows:

Note: The market values of the plan's assets at 01-01-09 and 01-01-11 have been adjusted to reflect the smoothing of gains and/or losses over a 4-year averaging period. This method will lower contributions in years of less than expected returns and increase contributions in years of greater than expected returns. The net effect over long periods of time is to have less variance in contribution levels from year to year.

#### SHALER TOWNSHIP POLICE PENSION PLAN SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION (UNAUDITED)

The comparability of trend information is affected by changes in actuarial assumptions, benefit provisions, actuarial funding methods, accounting policies, and other changes. Those changes usually affect trends in contribution requirements and in ratios that use the actuarial accrued liability as a factor.

Analysis of the dollar amount of the actuarial value of assets, actuarial accrued liability, and unfunded (assets in excess of) actuarial accrued liability in isolation can be misleading. Expressing the actuarial value of assets as a percentage of the actuarial accrued liability (Column 4) provides one indication of the plan's funding status on a going-concern basis. Analysis of this percentage, over time, indicates whether the system is becoming financially stronger or weaker. Generally, the greater this percentage, the stronger the plan.

Trends in unfunded (assets in excess of) actuarial accrued liability and annual covered payroll are both affected by inflation. Expressing the unfunded (assets in excess of) actuarial accrued liability as a percentage of annual covered payroll (Column 6) approximately adjusts for the effects of inflation and aids analysis of the plan's progress made in accumulating sufficient assets to pay benefits when due. Generally, where there is an unfunded actuarial accrued liability, the smaller this percentage, the stronger the plan. However, when assets are in excess of the actuarial accrued liability, the higher the bracketed percentage, the stronger the plan.
