Dear Mr. Foster and Mr. Scialabba:

We conducted a Limited Procedures Engagement (LPE) of the Huntingdon Area School District (District) to determine its compliance with certain relevant state laws, regulations, policies, and administrative procedures (relevant requirements). The LPE covers the period July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2016, except for any areas of compliance that may have required an alternative to this period. The engagement was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. §§ 402 and 403), but was not conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

As we conducted our LPE procedures, we sought to determine answers to the following questions, which serve as our LPE objectives:

- Did the District have documented board policies and administrative procedures related to the following?
 - Internal controls
 - o Budgeting practices
 - o The Right-to-Know Law
 - o The Sunshine Act
- Were the policies and procedures adequate and appropriate, and have they been properly implemented?
- Did the District comply with the relevant requirements in the Right-to-Know Law and the Sunshine Act?
- Did the District take appropriate corrective action to address the findings and observation made in our prior audit?

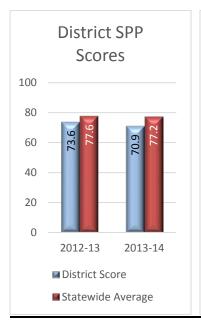
Academic Information

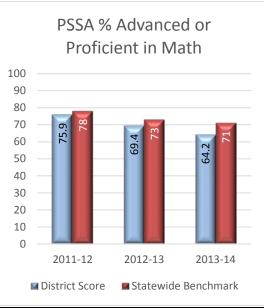
The following table and charts consist of School Performance Profile (SPP) scores and Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) results for the entire District obtained from PDE's data files. These scores are presented in the District's audit report for **informational purposes only**, and they were not audited by our Department.

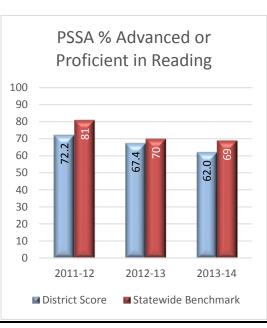
SPP benchmarks represent the statewide average of all district school buildings in the Commonwealth.² PSSA benchmarks and goals are determined by PDE each school year and apply to all public school entities.³ District SPP and PSSA scores were calculated using an average of all of the individual school buildings within the District. Scores below SPP statewide averages and PSSA benchmarks/goals are presented in red.

² Statewide averages for SPP scores were calculated based on all district school buildings throughout the Commonwealth, excluding charter and cyber charter schools.

³ PSSA benchmarks apply to all district school buildings, charters, and cyber charters. In the 2011-12 school year, the state benchmarks reflect the Adequate Yearly Progress targets established under No Child Left Behind. In the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, the state benchmarks reflect the statewide goals based on annual measurable objectives established by PDE.

⁴ The following letter grades are based on a 0-100 point system: A (90-100), B (80-89), C (70-79), D (60-69), F (59 or below).

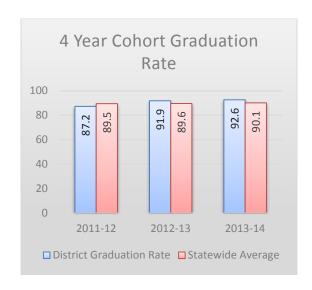

4 Year Cohort Gradation Rates

The cohort graduation rates are a calculation of the percentage of students who have graduated with a regular high school diploma within a designated number of years since the student first entered high school. The rate is determined for a cohort of students who have all entered high school for the first time during the same school year.⁶

Status of Prior Audit Findings and Observations

Our prior audit of the District released on August 8, 2013, resulted in two findings and one observation, as shown below. As part of our current engagement, we determined the status of corrective action taken by the District to implement our prior audit recommendations. We reviewed the District's September 25, 2013 written response provided to PDE, interviewed District personnel, and performed audit procedures as detailed in each status section below.

Auditor General Performance Audit Report Released on August 8, 2013

Prior Finding No. 1: Errors in Reporting Nonresident Pupil Membership Resulted in an Underpayment of Tuition for Foster Children of \$74,167

Prior Finding Summary: During our prior audit, discrepancies were found in the reporting of

nonresident pupil membership to PDE for the 2009-10 school year. Those errors resulted in an underpayment of \$74,167 in Commonwealth-paid tuition to the District for children placed in

private homes (foster children).

Prior Recommendations: Our prior audit finding recommended the District should:

- 1. Review the Pennsylvania Information Management System (PIMS) manual of reporting for instructions on the proper reporting of nonresident students.
- 2. Review membership reports submitted to PDE for years subsequent to the audit and, if similar errors are found, submit revised reports to PDE.

Our prior audit finding also recommended that PDE should:

3. Adjust the District's allocations to correct the underpayment of \$74,167.

Current Status:

During our current review, we found the District implemented all of our prior recommendations. A District Data Quality Team was established, and all members were trained. This training involved usage of the PIMS manuals as well as a review of District residence codes as it relates to student accounting. District monitoring procedures now include a review of all nonresident foster students to ensure proper residency and funding coding.

The District reviewed membership reports submitted to PDE for the subsequent years of 2010-11, 2011-12, and 2012-13 and did not find errors in these reporting years.

In August 2014, PDE adjusted the District's allocation to correct the underpayment of \$74,167.

Prior Finding No. 2: Certification Deficiencies

Prior Finding Summary: During our prior audit, we found that two teachers were assigned to

positions during the 2011-12 school year without possessing the

proper certification for those positions.

Prior Recommendations: Our prior audit finding recommended the District should:

1. Take the necessary action required to ensure compliance with certification regulations.

2. Ensure only properly certified professionals, holding current and valid certificates, are permitted to work in the District.

Our prior audit finding also recommended that PDE should:

3. Recover the subsidy forfeiture of \$4,934.

Current Status:

During our current review, we found the District implemented all of our prior recommendations. One teacher left the District at the conclusion of the 2011-12 school year. The second teacher has taken and passed the Praxis test, and a permanent teaching certificate was issued.

On December 26, 2013, PDE adjusted the District's allocations to recover the subsidy forfeiture of \$4,934.

Prior Observation: The District Lacks Sufficient Internal Controls Over Its Student Data

Prior Observation

<u>Summary:</u> During our prior audit, we found that the District's internal controls

over its data integrity needed to be improved.

<u>Prior Recommendations:</u> Our prior audit observation recommended the District should:

1. Develop documented procedures (e.g. procedure manuals, policies, or other written instructions) to ensure continuity over PIMS data submission if responsible persons were to leave the District suddenly or otherwise be unable to upload PIMS data to PDE.

- 2. Read and become familiar with the PIMS manual.
- 3. Review membership reports submitted to PDE for years subsequent to our audit, and if similar errors are found, submit revised reports to PDE.

Current Status:

During our current review, we found the District implemented all of our prior recommendations. A District Data Quality Team was established consisting of building level secretaries, principals, and the District PIMS administrator. All members were trained on the PIMS manuals, PIMS calendar, and the District's School Information System to improve the efficiency and accuracy of PIMS data.

A review of membership reports submitted to PDE for the subsequent years of 2010-11, 2011-12, and 2012-13 found no further errors in these reporting years.
