Dear Mrs. Vicente and Mr. Painter:

We conducted a Limited Procedures Engagement (LPE) of the Wyomissing Area School District (District) to determine its compliance with certain relevant state laws, regulations, policies, and administrative procedures (relevant requirements). The LPE covers the period July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2015, except for any areas of compliance that may have required an alternative to this period. The engagement was conducted pursuant to authority derived from Article VIII, Section 10 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and The Fiscal Code (72 P.S. §§ 402 and 403), but was not conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

As we conducted our LPE procedures, we sought to determine answers to the following questions, which serve as our LPE objectives:

- Did the District have documented board policies and administrative procedures related to the following?
 - Internal controls
 - o Budgeting practices
 - o The Right-to-Know Law
 - The Sunshine Act
- Were the policies and procedures adequate and appropriate, and have they been properly implemented?
- Did the District comply with the relevant requirements in the Right-to-Know Law and the Sunshine Act?
- Did the District take appropriate corrective action to address the finding made in our prior audit, and were the actions taken into effect?

Academic Information

The following table and charts consist of School Performance Profile (SPP) scores and Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) results for the entire District obtained from PDE's data files. These scores are presented in the District's audit report for **informational** purposes only, and they were not audited by our Department.


SPP benchmarks represent the statewide average of all district school buildings in the Commonwealth.² PSSA benchmarks and goals are determined by PDE each school year and apply to all public school entities.³ District SPP and PSSA scores were calculated using an average of all of the individual school buildings within the District. Scores below SPP statewide averages and PSSA benchmarks/goals are presented in red.

² Statewide averages for SPP scores were calculated based on all district school buildings throughout the Commonwealth, excluding charter and cyber charter schools.

³ PSSA benchmarks apply to all district school buildings, charters, and cyber charters. In the 2011-12 school year, the state benchmarks reflect the Adequate Yearly Progress targets established under No Child Left Behind. In the 2012-13 and 2013-14 school years, the state benchmarks reflect the statewide goals based on annual measurable objectives established by PDE.

⁴ The following letter grades are based on a 0-100 point system: A (90-100), B (80-89), C (70-79), D (60-69), F (59 or below).

4 Year Cohort Graduation Rates

The cohort graduation rates are a calculation of the percentage of students who have graduated with a regular high school diploma within a designated number of years since the student first entered high school. The rate is determined for a cohort of students who have all entered high school for the first time during the same school year.⁶

Status of Prior Audit Findings and Observations

Our prior audit of the District released on October 1, 2013, resulted in one finding, as shown below. As part of our current engagement, we determined the status of corrective action taken by the District to implement our prior audit recommendations. We interviewed District personnel and performed audit procedures as detailed in each status section below.

Auditor General Performance Audit Report Released on October 1, 2013

Prior Finding: Pupil Transportation Reporting Errors Resulted in Overpayments

of \$22,450

Prior Finding Summary: Our prior audit of the District's transportation records for the 2008-09

and 2009-10 school years found errors in mileage data reported to PDE in both school years. The errors resulted in overpayments of \$19,325 and \$3,125 for the 2008-09 and 2009-10 school years,

respectively.

<u>Prior Recommendations:</u> We recommended that the District should:

- 1. Develop procedures to ensure that sample averaging calculations are accurate, thus ensuring that the District is reporting the correct data to PDE and receiving the correct reimbursement.
- 2. Ensure a review of automated calculations is completed prior to submission of data to PDE.
- 3. Review reports for years subsequent to the 2009-10 school year, and if errors are found, submit revisions to PDE.

We also recommended that PDE should:

4. Recover the overpayments of \$22,450 from the District.

Current Status:

During our current audit, we found that the District implemented our prior recommendations. The District established new procedures to ensure the accuracy of sample average calculations and has set up a multi-tier review process prior to the submission of transportation reports to PDE. The District also purchased transportation software that automatically calculates the PDE reimbursement, which should reduce reporting errors. The overpayments identified in the previous audit were recovered by PDE from the District's January 5, 2016 basic education funding payment.
